The Principal Observes

Teaching Thankfulness

As we approach Thanksgiving Day, I am reminded that it is vital to teach our children to show gratitude. While being thankful comes easy to some, most children are not naturally thankful. Within the first hour of birth, babies send an urgent message that they want to eat, and they do not want to wait for it. This is only the beginning of their demands that continue for years. As they grow up, we can reason with them, teaching them concepts such as thankfulness. Even so, it takes patience and consistency because they are naturally self-focused.

I have three strategies for building thankfulness in our children and teens. First, we can teach gratefulness by modeling it ourselves. If our children hear us giving thanks, they will be inclined to follow our example. Likewise, if they hear us complaining about our bosses, paychecks, traffic, and other big and small annoyances, they will learn that grumbling is normal. Paul's command to Christians is the best; "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). I realize that this is an admonition to all of us, but it is true that children naturally follow the pattern we set.

Second, we should give children opportunities to be grateful. For example, if they have

their chores for them. Listen carefully to their response. If you hear, "It's about time" instead of "Thank you," you have some instructing to do. For a child whose life consists of endless routines, getting relief from chores should produce joy and thanksgiving, so we want to give them regular opportunities to say "Thank you" for things they could take for granted.

Third, we must teach them to say "Thank you" for everyday provisions as well as for extra gifts. Just as we teach them to pray before meals to thank God for the food, so we teach our children to show gratitude to the preparer. If they learn this discipline, they will be saying "Thank you" at least three times a day. They will hopefully then find it easy to say "Thank you" throughout their lives and especially when they receive birthday and Christmas gifts. Of course, speaking our gratefulness is vital, but so is writing it. To communicate its importance, parents may need to set aside a specific time after birthdays and Christmases to help their children focus on writing thank you notes.

Ultimately, we want to teach our children to thank God for his goodness. James reminds us that; "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (1:17). Thankfulness is what we need to teach at Thanksgiving.
